Situated at the edges of the towering Great Oak, these academic halls will provide an ideal educational setting.

In addition to the open space provided by the courtyard, the halls will include spacious porticos and balconies. The halls will have the capability to increase the caliber and visibility of our already notable institution and will provide an attractive new landscape for prospective families and returning alumni.







The Immortalization of a Great Leader: The Reverend Doctor Robert Parks, Co-Founder of Episcopal High School

Each student who enters the doors of The Nancy B. and Robert R. Parks Hall will carry forward the legacy of the late Rev. Dr. Robert Parks. A revered leader for the Episcopal Diocese of Florida, Parks spearheaded the transformation of an abandoned estate and boys' home into a renowned preparatory school dedicated to "developing the doers of good and leaders of mankind." He died in October of 2009 at the age of 91. The founding of Episcopal High School was Parks' long-fought dream and, like Parks, the building that will carry his name will provide a gateway to wisdom and Christian leadership.



Celebrating Education: Delores and Allen Lastinger

For the Lastinger family, Eagle pride runs deep and strong Delores served as an Episcopal mathematics teacher and went on to become Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Today, she and husband Allen, former Chief Executive Officer of Barnett Banks, serve as Honorary Trustees. During their long relationship with the school, they have served on numerous leadership committees, and their three children Lane ('85), Lindsey ('90) and Amy ('91), are proud graduates of Episcopal. As a structure designed to advance learning, Lastinger Hall will be a fitting tribute to the educators Delores once called her colleagues and the children will always call their teachers.
